Their Maj^{ties} Council having mett in James City the 16th ditto, have ordered that no collector shall clear any European Ship or Vessel until the first of March in order to their sailing to Point Comfort in James River there to make up their Fleet, but not to sail until the 15th of March, a copy of which order is sent to M^r Blackiston their Maj^{ties} Collector in the Province of Maryland which I doubt not but will be duly observed which is all at present from
