

Lib. R. R. R Came Robert Crossman by Kenelm Cheseldine his Attorney and prayed a Lett<sup>r</sup> from the hon<sup>ble</sup> the Secrys to Maj<sup>r</sup> William Boareman for the payment of ffour thousand pounds of tobacco to him the s<sup>d</sup> Crossman according to an ord<sup>r</sup> of his L<sup>sp</sup> and Councill of the 29<sup>th</sup> of Aprill 1684: in favour of him the said Crossman w<sup>ch</sup> their Hono<sup>rs</sup> the Secrys accordingly caused to be writt (viz<sup>t</sup>)

Cap<sup>t</sup> Robert Crossman a considerable Credito<sup>r</sup> to the Estate of M<sup>r</sup> George Manwaring decd: (of whose land you obtained his L<sup>sp</sup>s Grant) haveing made his humble address to his L<sup>sp</sup>: and Councill, It was considered that you ought to satisfie to the said Crossman towards the discharge of his debt the summe of ffour thousand pounds of tobacco, and we were thereupon ordered to signifie soe much to you, as hereby wee doe, desireing you to comply punctually with the result of his L<sup>sp</sup> and Councill aforesaid in paying the aforesaid summe of ffour thousand pounds of tobacco to the said Crossman or his ord<sup>r</sup> in consideration of your said Grant from his L<sup>dsp</sup>: this from
