

Lib. R. R. R. said he knew the Charter well enough, or words to that effect: That from thence they fell to discouse of the Command<sup>rs</sup> power, and he produced his Commission and Instructions, some of which the Deponent thinkes he read; but they alledging that he ought to have applyed himself to the Governm<sup>t</sup> upon his arrivall into the Province, and civilly have made knowne his power, he replyed he had nothing to doe with the Governm<sup>t</sup> his business was with the Kings Collecto<sup>r</sup> and my Lord Effingham his Chiefe Master in these parts. The greate power and priviledge granted by his Maj<sup>tie</sup> to his L<sup>sp</sup> in his Charter of Maryland was then urged to him, and that thereby all persons civil and military were required to be obedient to his Maj<sup>ties</sup> Commands therein; The Command<sup>r</sup> then replyed he knew it, and sayd that if any occasion offered he would be ready and willing to aid and assist his L<sup>sp</sup>: and his Governm<sup>t</sup> but to deliver up the Prisoner upon any demand made in the Lord Prop<sup>rys</sup> name he could not, but in the Kings name he would: The discourse being ended, and the said Coll Darnall and Maj<sup>r</sup> Sewall takeing their leaves, The Command<sup>r</sup> ord<sup>ed</sup> his pinnace to waite on them ashoare; soe goeing over the sides The said Coll Darnall once more in the name of the R<sup>t</sup> hon<sup>ble</sup> the Lord Prop<sup>ry</sup> demanded the delivery up of the prisoner to the Governm<sup>t</sup> but he refused again soe to doe, and thereupon they putt off; but after the civility of the shipp shewed them, and they gotten some distance off the Ketch, The Command<sup>r</sup> ord<sup>ed</sup> the pinnace back aboard, and accordingly wee were carried aboard, where the Command<sup>r</sup> and the said Coll Darnall and Maj<sup>r</sup> Sewall, went into the Cabin, and had some discourse, which was (as this Depon<sup>t</sup> was told, and understood by the sequell) that he the said Com<sup>and</sup><sup>r</sup> was informed that they had layd waite with twenty men ashoare to surprize his men, To which the s<sup>d</sup> Allen added, (in the heareing of this Deponent goeing downe into the Cabbin) by God gentlemen if you offer any such thing, expect nothing but fire and sword from me or words to that effect, but they haveing satisfied him with the falsity of the Report, he civilly dismissed them, and ordered his Pinnance again to waite on them ashoare
