The Lord Baltimore having complained to us of some Infringem<sup>t</sup> made upon his Rights by an Act of Assembly of Maryland ascertaining the Bounds of Land and likewise an Injury done him by another Act for securing Adm<sup>rs</sup> & Executors from double Payment of Debts and limiting the Time for Payment of Obligations within that Province We send you here inclosed Copies of his Lordship's Observations upon and Objections against both the said Acts that you may consider thereof with due Regard to his Lordship's Rights and take such Measures thereupon as may be agreeable to Reason & Justice. So we bid you heartily farewell
