We have just received a Message from his Excellency together with several Letters he hath been pleased to lay before us in relation to an Incursion of the Indians into the Cove Settlement within or very near this Province

We are heartily desirous of making provision for the relief of the Back Inhabitants and think a further Engagement of the Ordinary Licence fund

Should your Honours reject the Bill now before you applying that money one of the Best means in our power. But as we are in a State of uncertainty as to your Determination on the College Bill we are under a Necessity of repeating our yesterdays Application that you will Speedily inform us of your Resolutions thereon by which we may be enabled at Once to answer the Governors Message and the reasonable Expectations of the distressed People who call for Assistance. p. 186
