

1 during any emergency caused by disasters or enemy attack,
2 and then only to the extent necessary to preserve continuity
3 of State and local public offices and governmental opera-
4 tions. The General Assembly by law shall prescribe measures
5 to preserve this continuity during such an emergency."

6 It is to make clear the limitations on the Gen-
7 eral Assembly, and yet to note it is only the General
8 Assembly by law which can prescribe any measures to pre-
9 serve continuity thus embodied in the Constitution.

14 article, who has power to suspend the Constitution?

15 DELEGATE PENNIMAN: Any action that may be taken
