2 that no other state has done it prevailed, there would
3 be no unified court system and no unified executive in New
4 Jersey. So, Mr. Chairman, I think our job here is not
5 to be concerned with what others have done, but be concerned
6 with what we need to do to establish a strong and effective
7 Constitution and make as a citadel for the people in that
8 Constitution a strong and effective legislature.
