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DELEGATE CLAGETT: The objection provided by law of the minority seemed to have some merit in that it would relieve the district judge of the responsibility of interviewing, selecting and granting special appointments to the successful applicant as a Commissioner.

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DELEGATE MUDD: The first observation you made was persuasive. Our committee was anxious to relieve the district judge of any appointive responsibility. But on the other hand as I recollect the testimony and discussion in committee it was our considered opinion after careful deliberation that the work of these commissioners was the function of the judiciary and to some extent or to a great extent the responsibility for administration of the court system carried through to these commissioners, and that it was just impractical in the final analysis for a district court judge to have to try to properly administer justice in his district if he had no control over the Commissioners.

By experience there was a wealth of testimony before our committee that some present committing magistrates are not capable of performing the functions
