2 offenses it was the intent of the Committee they should
3 continue because this was a very important right, even
4 though the offense is a minor offense?

5 DELEGATE CLARK: Delegate Kiefer.

6 DELEGATE KIEFER: This is correct.

7 DELEGATE CLARK: The Chair recognizes Delegate
8 Lloyd Taylor.

9 DELEGATE LLOYD TAYLOR: The Committee voted to
10 remain silent on the question of capital punishment. In
11 Section 5, Part B, we have a statement pertaining to death,
12 or life imprisonment. Is this going against the Committee's
13 decision to remain silent on the question of capital
14 punishment?

15 DELEGATE CLARK: Delegate Kiefer.

16 DELEGATE KIEFER: No, we still have capital
17 punishment, and we still have life imprisonment. All this
18 does is state that in certain cases other than capital
19 punishment or life imprisonment cases, certain actions
20 can or should be taken. It has nothing to do with
21 abolishing capital punishment.
