March 8, 1867.

*Gentlemen of the Senate:*

We have received from your honorable body the house bill to repeal and re-enact certain sections of the local laws of Baltimore city, entitled "Police," with proposed amendments. We have concurred in all the amendments except the following :

Section 1, line 21, insert after the word "Baltimore" one of whom shall have been a resident of the first Legislative District, one a resident of the second Legislative District, and one a resident of the third Legislative District of said city of Baltimore for at least the term of one year next preceding the day of his election."

The House having refused to concur in said amendment, we respectfully request your honorable body to recede therefrom.
