

So the amendment was rejected.

Mr. Street demanded the previous question.

The question then being, "shall the main question be now put?"

It was decided in the affirmative.

The question then recurring upon the second reading of the bill,

Said bill, as amended, was read the second time, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

On motion of Mr. Kirk,

Said bill, as amended, was then ordered to be printed.

The House then proceeded to the consideration of next order of the day, being

The bill, entitled an Act to repeal sections 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, of Article XCV., of the Code of Public General Laws, title "Usury," and to re-enact the same so as to read as follows.

Said bill being upon a second reading.

On motion of Mr. Clark, of Baltimore City,

The further consideration thereof was postponed, and

Said bill made the order of the day, for Wednesday next, at 1 o'clock P. M.
