aforeſaid, during his continuance in office, and to inſpect all proviſions brought thereto for ſale, and deſtroy any he ſhall find and adjudge unſound or unwholeſome; and alſo to try the weights and meaſures uſed at the ſaid market by ſtandards, if any provided and kept there by ſaid commiſſioners of ſaid market for that purpoſe, and the ſame, when falſe or untrue, to ſeiſe and diſpoſe to the higheſt bidder, and ſhall pay the money ariſing from ſuch ſale to the ſaid commiſſioners, to be by them applied as aforeſaid; and the clerk of the ſaid market (unleſs prevented by ſickneſs, or other unavoidable accident or neceſſity) ſhall, and he is hereby required to attend in the ſaid market, at ſuch hours as the commiſſioners may appoint at the different ſeaſons; and if ſuch clerk ſhall neglect or reſuſe to attend as aforeſaid, he ſhall, for every ſuch offence, forfeit and pay the ſum of five ſhillings current money, to be recovered by the commiſſioners of ſaid market for the time being, before any juſtice of the peace for Washington county, to be paid and applied by them to the uſe aforeſaid; and the ſaid clerk may be removed and diſplaced by ſaid commiſſioners for the time being at their pleaſure or direction.

XI. **And**, whereas it has been practiſed by people coming in from the county, to tie their horſes in the ſaid market-houſe, which is very indecent, and offenſive to the inhabitants of the ſaid town: **Be it enacted**, That any perſon or perſons, who ſhall, after the time aforeſaid, put their own, or any other perſon's horſe, mare or gelding, into or under the ſaid market-houſe, on any pretence whatſoever, he or they ſhall pay or forfeit two ſhillings and ſix-pence current money, with coſt aforeſaid, to be recovered, paid and applied, as aforeſaid.

XII. **And be it enacted**, That if any perſon appointed commiſſioner by this act, ſhall die, reſuſe, or otherwiſe be rendered incapable to diſcharge the duties enjoined by this act, that the juſtices of Washington county may nominate and appoint ſome perſon or perſons in his or their place, ſo as to make the number of three commiſſioners as aforeſaid, and that the commiſſioners ſo appointed ſhall have the ſame powers as the commiſſioners appointed by this act.

C H A P. XIV.

An ACT for the ſale of the glebe-land in Shrewsbury pariſh in Kent county.

The veſtrymen and wardens are empowered to ſell the ſaid lands at auction, and to apply the money towards the purchaſe of another piece of land, more conveniently ſituated; but, if they ſhall not ſpeedily be able to purchaſe, they are directed to place the money at intereſt, for the benefit of the incumbent, for the time being: In caſe of no incumbent, the intereſt ſhall be consolidated with the principal, until the purchaſe can be made, which it is their duty to make as ſoon as poſſible.

C H A P. XV.

An ACT for laying out a road leading from Doctor Ephraim Howard's tilting-forge, in the upper parts of Elk-Ridge, to interſect the public road leading to Elk-Ridge Landing, by William Hobbs's dwelling plantation, in Anne-Arundel county.

To be a public waggon road, twenty feet wide, and not to go, without conſent of the proprietor, through any orchard, meadow or garden. It is to be laid out by three commiſſioners, named in the act, who are to value the damage thereby incurred, by the owners of land; and the ſaid Ephraim Howard is, within three months, to pay the ſame.
