OPPOSING CANDIDATES

President & Vice President

No opposition for President—
John Adams (F)

GOVERNOR

John Eager Howard (F)

Secretary of State

This office was not created until 1838.

MARYLAND ELECTION RETURNS

Washington elected unanimously
6 electoral votes

NATIONAL ELECTION RETURNS

Washington received the unanimous vote of
the country.

69 electoral votes

John Adams received 34 electoral votes
(plurality) for Vice President.

MISCELLANEA

New York City, the setting for the first inau-
gural, was the Capital of the United States at
this time.

Thomas Jefferson served as Secretary of
State, Alexander Hamilton as Secretary of
the Treasury in this Administration. They
held opposing views on national issues and
on the formation of political parties; Hamil-
ton and his supporters promoted the Federal-
ist Party, Jefferson and those who followed
him, the Democratic-Republican Party who
held anti-Federalist sentiments.
