### MISCELLANEA

Jackson conducted the first campaign trip and was the first President to ride on a train — a 12 mile journey on the Baltimore and Ohio. One of the accomplishments in this second term was to pay off the national debt in 1835. The federal government was collecting more in taxes than it was spending. The next year, an act was passed to distribute surplus federal funds to the States.
