

Pending the consideration whereof,

The hour of 12 o'clock, Meridian, having arrived, in accordance with the message sent to the Senate, and in conformity with the Act of Congress approved 25th of July, 1866, entitled an "Act to regulate the times and manner of holding elections for Senators in Congress," the Senators appeared in the Hall of the House of Delegates; whereupon the members of both Houses convened in Joint Assembly, and the Journal of each House was read, and it appeared that the Honorable Wm. Pinkney Whyte had received a majority of all the votes in each House; thereupon the Chairman declared the Hon. William Pinkney White duly elected Senator to represent the State of Maryland in the Congress of the United States for six years from the 4th of March, 1875.

On motion of Mr. Tuck, the Joint Assembly then adjourned.

The House then resumed the consideration of the proposed message to the Senate, in reference to election of Police Commissioners.

The question recurring upon concurring in the motion submitted by Mr. McColgan to refer said message to the Select Committee on Police.
