

ganized a public school, and appointed the following persons as trustees, viz:—John Quarles, William Wilson, Henry C. Stump, William Worthington, Samuel Worthington, Christopher Wilson, John Sappington and Richard J. Jackson, and have prayed an act of incorporation,—Therefore: CHAP. 295.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That the said trustees above named, and their successors, shall be a body corporate, and shall have perpetual succession by the name and style of the Trustees of the Darlington Academy, and by that name may sue and be sued, and have a corporate seal, which they may break, alter and change at pleasure, may hold property to an amount not exceeding five thousand dollars, and dispose of the same, may make by-laws not contrary to the laws of this State or the United States, and do all other acts necessary for the regulation, prosperity and the promotion of education in said academy.

SEC. 2. *And be it enacted,* That when a vacancy occurs in the board of trustees, the same shall be filled by an election, and at such election every free white citizen that may have contributed to the building of said academy to the amount of ten dollars, or do contribute to the support of said academy, shall be entitled to vote for trustees at such elections.

SEC. 3. *And be it enacted,* That if any trustee shall neglect to attend to the duties of his office for the space of twelve months, his place shall be considered vacated.

CHAPTER 295.

\* SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That the acts passed at December session, Repeal of former acts
