

“Dorchester County,” sub-title “Fish,” and re-enact the same with amendments.

With the following proposed amendments :

AMENDMENT PROPOSED.

Strike out after the words “A Bill,” and insert the following :

Entitled an Act to repeal section one hundred and eighty-five, of Article ten, of the Code of Public Local Laws, title “Dorchester County,” sub title “Fish,” as the same was repealed and re enacted by the Act of eighteen hundred and ninety, chapter five hundred and sixteen, and to re-enact the same with amendments, and to add an additional section thereto, to be designated section 185 B.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That section one hundred and eighty-five, of Article ten, of the Code of Public Local Laws, title “Dorchester County,” sub-title “Fish,” as the same was repealed and re-enacted by the Act of eighteen hundred and ninety, chapter five hundred and sixteen, be and the same is hereby repealed and re-enacted with amendments, so as to read as follows :

Sec. 185. It shall be unlawful for any person to use patent twine weirs or other twine weirs, pound-nets, fykes or hauling seines of greater length than three hundred and fifty feet for taking or catching fish, terrapins or crabs, in the following waters of Dorchester county: All that part of Fishing Bay north of a line from Roasting Ear point to the upper side of Duck Island Cove, or any of the Tributaries of Honga River, Black Water River or its tributaries, Little Choptank and its tributaries; provided, that the provisions of the sub-title of this Article shall not apply to that portion of the Little Choptank River and the tributaries thereof, lying south of a line drawn from James' Point to the north end or limits of the point of land on the Susquehanna shore, on the west side of the mouth of Woolford's Creek, or to fasten or stick stakes in that part of Black Water River lying between a line drawn from Grog Point to a point directly opposite on the other side of said river, and a line drawn from Booze's ditch to the opposite side of the river, except in the bends of said river where stake weirs are now set.
