not putting the appropriations in there and the other
by some legal device or constitutional device of eliminating them or cutting them down later on. I think that
is one of the finest provisions.

Two or three times in my experience, or rather, in Mr. Cook's experience, there was an attempt to eliminate that. Frankly, I think that would be the most deleterious thing you could do to the public schools in Maryland, if there were any attempt. I cite that as a possibility. I cite that as one of the things that could happen if the approach of this were destructive.

The third approach, it seems to me, is constructive. Let's go back to 1867, when this Constitution was developed or prepared. It came after a period of strife. It was in force somewhat by the congress in most of the southern states and it was not there written in the light of racial prejudice only. I think, if I may get in a little advertising, that probably the finest single book on reconstruction I have ever read -- do you want me to take five or ten minutes?

THE CHAIRLADY: Five or ten minutes. We

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
