3 than as a statute?

4 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes.

5 MR. SYKES: The Council took no position on  
6 this point. I could see arguments pro and con.

7 MRS. FREEDLANDER: There are some on the  
8 Commission who feel that the Bill of Rights is the one  
9 place where we can serve the community in giving aspira-  
10 tion.

11 MR. SYKES: You might incorporate by reference  
12 the Book of Psalms which has some very nice aspirations.  
13 Only you may run into the establishment of religion, if  
14 you do that.

15 THE CHAIRMAN: Well, there are many problems,  
16 as you well know, involving intergroup relations that  
17 many perhaps would desire to have in the Bill of Rights  
18 and some feel that the Bill of Rights should strictly  
19 contain restraints against state action and that is all,  
20 and not attempt to regulate on a constitutional level  
21 relations between individuals.
