

1 MR. SYKES: Well, as I say, the Council has
2 taken no position. If you want -- I have arrived at no
3 opinion. I know some of the arguments, I thought about
4 it a little bit, and if you want a balanced presentation
5 of some of the considerations, which will leave you no
6 better of in your judgment as to which way to go than
7 when I started, I will be glad to discuss it with you;
8 but I don't know whether that is going to help you any.

9 THE CHAIRMAN: No. We are aware of the pros
10 and cons. We just want to see where the weight of opinion
11 may be in the matter and if the Council has not taken a
12 position on it, then that is the way it is. We under-
13 stand.

14 MR. GENTRY: I appreciate your statement very
15 much. I think you have drawn back from it in your
16 remarks somewhat.
