DELEGATE MOORE: That was true of Montgomery.
SENATOR JAMES: Montgomery, too. So, you get
these artificial limits and you can run into situations
THE CHAIRMAN: How would you write it in the
Constitution, if you were rewriting it? Would you leave
it to statute?
SENATOR JAMES: I'm not sure, but
MR. ENEY: Look at Question 10 and
SENATOR JAMES: With that experience under my
belt, I'm a little bit leery of maximums and minimums.
THE CHAIRMAN: You wouldn't write it in the
Constitution?
SENATOR JAMES: No.
MR. ENEY: Which of these elements in Question
10 do you think might be or might not be in the Consti-
tution?
SENATOR JAMES: Are you shifting?
MR. ENEY: No, the same thing.
SENATOR JAMES: What constitutional guidelines
should be used for apportionment and districting? Well,
equal, compact and contiguous, I think, are the legal
