

1 DELEGATE MOORE: That was true of Montgomery.

2 SENATOR JAMES: Montgomery, too. So, you get
3 these artificial limits and you can run into situations --

5 Constitution, if you were rewriting it? Would you leave
6 it to statute?

7 SENATOR JAMES: I'm not sure, but --

8 MR. ENEY: Look at Question 10 and --

9 SENATOR JAMES: With that experience under my
10 belt, I'm a little bit leery of maximums and minimums.

11 THE CHAIRMAN: You wouldn't write it in the
12 Constitution?

13 SENATOR JAMES: No.

14 MR. ENEY: Which of these elements in Question
15 10 do you think might be or might not be in the Consti-
16 tution?

17 SENATOR JAMES: Are you shifting?

18 MR. ENEY: No, the same thing.
