which he was later criminally charged; he was dismissed from all of his offices on October 2 and 3, 1693; he died much indebted to the crown for customs fees previously collected but not paid to the government, which led to extended controversy and litigation over the settlement of his estate.

SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: naturalized by an Act of the Assembly, 1682; Gent., by 1684; went to England in 1692, with no mention of him found thereafter in Maryland records. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: servant, free by 1681/82; planter; Indian trader. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE Associators' Convention. St. Mary's City, 1689-1692. OTHER PROVINCIAL OFFICE: agent to New York on Indian affairs, 1690-1691. LOCAL OFFICES: alderman, St. Mary's City, 1689; probably a justice, St. Mary's County, 1692. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. BLAY, EDWARD (ca. 1653-1713). BORN: ca. 1653 in Anne Arundel County; first son. NATIVE: second generation. RESIDED: in Anne Arundel County; Cecil County, by 1685; Kent County, by 1707. FAMILY BACKGROUND, FATHER: William Blay (?-ca. 1661), who was probably transported to Virginia as a servant in 1636, but was in Maryland by 1652 when he surveyed 600 acres in Anne Arundel County. MARRIED first, Barbara, daughter of Josias Lanham. MARRIED second, by 1695 Anne (?-1712/13), widow of Robert Burnan. CHILDREN. SON: William Blay (ca. 1681-1716), who married Isabella, daughter of William Pearce (ca. 1641-1720/21). PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCA-TION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Anglican. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., by 1697. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter; merchant. PUB-LIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Cecil County, 1697 (elected to the 7th session), 1704-1707, Kent County, 1712-1713 (died before the 3rd session). BLAY, WILLIAM (ca. 1681-1716). BORN: ca. 1681 in Cecil County, of age by 1702; only son. NATIVE: third generation. RESIDED: in Cecil County; Kent County, by 1702. FAMILY BACK-GROUND. FATHER: Edward Blay (ca. 1653-1713). MOTHER: probably Barbara, daughter of Josias Lanham. STEPMOTHER: probably Anne (?-1712/13), widow of Robert Burnan. MARRIED Isabella, daughter of William Pearce (ca. 1641-1720/21). She subsequently married by 1722 John Johnson. Her brothers were Daniel Pearce (1677-1727): William, Jr. (?-1703): and Benjamin (1683-1734), who married Mary, widow of John Hynson (ca. 1670-1708). Her sisters were Elizabeth, who married Henry Ward (?-1734): Sarah. CHILDREN. SONS: Edward (1707-?); William (1714-?).
