SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: purchased 365 additional acres in St. Mary's County, 1759–1765; sold 130 acres in St. Mary's County in 1766. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: will probated on March 11, 1768, in St. Mary's County. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £3,433.6.7 current money (including 35 slaves, 1 servant, plate, and books); FB, estate overpaid £13.13.8. LAND: 758 acres in St. Mary's County, plus 2 lots in Leonardtown, St. Mary's County.

**CHEW, SAMUEL** (ca. 1630–1676/77). BORN: in 1630 in Virginia. IMMIGRATED: by 1659 as a free adult with his wife from Virginia. RESIDED: in Anne Arundel County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: John Chew (?–by 1688), who immigrated to Virginia in 1621 or 1622 with his wife and three servants, and who became a prosperous merchant. He served as a member of the Virginia House of Burgesses, 1623–1624, 1627, 1642–1643, 1644. MOTHER: Sarah. BROTHER: Joseph. MARRIED in 1658 Ann, daughter of William Ayres, of Nansemond County, Virginia. CHILDREN. SONS: Samuel (ca. 1660–1718), a justice of Anne Arundel County in 1685, who married first in 1682 Anne (?–1702), and second, in 1704 Elizabeth (?–1709/10), widow of William Coale and daughter of *Thomas Thurston* (ca. 1622–1693); Joseph (1662/63–1704/5), who married first, (name unknown), and second, Elizabeth, daughter of Henry Hanslap; Nathaniel; William (?–1709/10); Benjamin (1671–1700), who married in 1692 Elizabeth Benson; John (?–1696/97); and Caleb (?–1688). DAUGHTERS: Sarah (?–1740), who married after 1676 Edward Burgess, son of *William Burgess* (ca. 1622–1686/87); and Anne (?–1699/1700). PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Quaker, perhaps convinced by George Fox. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: his father was a prominent merchant and officeholder in Virginia; Samuel became a leader of the Quaker community in Maryland. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: merchant; planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Anne Arundel County, 1661; Upper House, 1671–1674/75 (Accounts 1), 1676 (died before the 2nd session).

OTHER PROVINCIAL OFFICES: Council, 1669–1676/77; justice, Provincial Court, 1669–1676/77. LOCAL OFFICES: sheriff, Anne Arundel County, 1663–1664; justice, Anne Arundel County, 1665–1669 (quorum, 1668–1669). MILITARY SERVICE: colonel, 1675–1676/77. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: over 1,000 acres. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: on March 15, 1676/77. LAND: over 2,000 acres.

**CHEW, SAMUEL** (by 1734–1786). BORN: between ca. 1727 and 1734; eldest son. NATIVE: sixth generation. RESIDED: in Herring Bay, Anne Arundel County; on Kent Island, Queen Anne's County, after 1785. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: Samuel Chew (ca. 1704–1736/37). STEPFATHER: *Daniel Dulany* (1685–1753). MOTHER: Henrietta Maria (?–1765), daughter of *Philemon Lloyd* (ca. 1674–1732/33). BROTHERS: Philemon (?–1770); Bennett (?–1793), who married in 1763 Anna Maria, daughter of *Edward Tilghman* (1713–1786). HALF BROTHERS: Lloyd Dulany (1742–ca. 1782); Richard Dulany (?–died in infancy). STEPBROTHERS: *Daniel Dulany, Jr.* (1722–1797); *Walter Dulany* (?–1773); and Dennis Dulany (1730–1779). SISTERS: Henrietta Maria (1731–1762), who married *Edward Dorsey* (1718–1760); Margaret (?–1773), who married *John Beale Bordley* (1726/27–1804); Ann Mary (1736–1774), who married in 1763 *William Paca* (1740–1799). STEPSISTERS: Rebecca Dulany, who married first, James Paul Heath (?–1746), and second, William Hedges; Rachel Dulany, who married first, William Knight, and second, Rev. Henry Addison; Margaret Dulany, who married first, Dr. *Alexander Hamilton* (1712–1756), and second, *William Murdock* (?–1769); and Mary Dulany. STEPNEPHEW: *James Heath* (?–1766). MARRIED by 1759 Elizabeth (1729–1807), widow of Richard Snowden, Jr. (?–1753), of Prince George's County; daughter of John Croley (Crowley) (?–1749), of Prince George's County, and wife Miriam (?–1767), who subsequently married (first name unknown) Richardson. CHILDREN. SONS: Samuel Lloyd (1756–1796), who married in 1777 Dorothy Harrison (1758–1791); John Croley (by 1767–by 1786). DAUGHTERS: Henrietta Maria (1759–1847), who married in 1775 *Benjamin Galloway* (1752–1831); Elizabeth (1765–?), who married in 1781 Peregrine Fitzhugh (1759–1810) and who died in New York; and Ann (after 1770–?), who died in New York. PRIVATE CAREER. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Anglican; his wife was a Quaker. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., 1759; Esq., 1779. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter. PUBLIC CA-
