

**Matthias Vanderheyden** (?–1729), and **John Thompson** (?–1701). She subsequently married **Roger Larramore** (?–1721), and finally, **Henry Ripper** (1683–1734/35). Her cousins were **Henry Ward** (?–1734); **Richard Thompson** (ca. 1680–by 1775); and **Augustine Thompson** (1691–ca. 1738/39). CHILDREN. SONS: **Thomas** (1703/4–1734); **James** (1711–1734); **Peregrine** (1711–1747), who married **Mary**, daughter of **Francis Holland** and wife **Susanna Utie**. DAUGHTERS: **Mary** (1705–?); **Mary** (1709–?), who married in 1729 **Thomas Henderson**; and **Sarah** (1713–1757), who married first, **Thomas Holland**, son of **William Holland** (?–1732), and second, **Robert Freeland**. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate, almost certainly attended school in England. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Anglican. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: second generation burgess and third generation local officeholder. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter; merchant. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Cecil County, 1702 (elected to the 3rd session, but disqualified for not being of age), 1703–1704 (probably elected to the 4th session, certainly elected by the 5th session), 1704–1707 (Elections and Privileges 3), 1708A, 1708B–1711. LOCAL OFFICES: surveyor, Cecil County, 1698–1700; North Sassafras Parish Vestry, Cecil County, 1703–1704, 1713; justice, Cecil County, by 1708/9–1715. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: controlled ca. 2,700 acres of his father's estate. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: inventory dated February 8, 1715/16. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £884.12.4 sterling; FB, £855.13.9. LAND: ca. 2,100 acres.

**FRISBY, WILLIAM** (by 1664–1713). BORN: by 1664 in Virginia; younger son. IMMIGRATED: by 1665 as a minor with his father from Virginia. RESIDED: in Baltimore County; Kent County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: **James Frisby** (?–1674), who immigrated to Virginia with his family in 1654. He owned 600 acres in Lower Norfolk County, Virginia, and eventually acquired 1,950 acres in Maryland. He was a planter, merchant, and justice of Baltimore County from 1665 to 1674. MOTHER: **Mary**. BROTHERS: **James Frisby** (ca. 1651–1704); **Thomas**. MARRIED first, in 1684 **Mary** (?–1699), daughter of **Symon Carpenter**. MARRIED second, **Rachel** (?–1703). MARRIED third, **Ann** (?–1721). CHILDREN. SONS: **William Frisby** (1684–1738), who married **Jane**, daughter of **John Thompson** (?–1701); **James** (1685–1721); **Richard** (?–1703); **Thomas** (?–1711); and **Stephen** (?–1712). DAUGHTER: **Anne** (1713/14–after 1775),

who married **Peregrine Frisby**. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Anglican. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: went to England in 1693 and 1695, and possibly in 1697–1698, when he was again out of the province. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter; merchant. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Kent County, 1694–1697 (Aggrievances 5), 1704–1707 (Elections and Privileges 1), 1708A. OTHER PROVINCIAL OFFICE: agent to England, 1695. LOCAL OFFICES: justice, Kent County, 1685–1689 (quorum, 1688–1689), 1693 (refused to take the required oath), 1694–1697 (president), 1701/2 (refused to take the required oath), 1702 (refused to take the required oath); **St. Paul's Parish Vestry**, Kent County, 1693–1706, 1711–1713. STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES: opposed the revolution of Protestant Associators in 1689. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: probably 1,250 acres. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: buried on December 17, 1713. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £1,318.17.1 sterling (including 14 slaves). LAND: 1,250 acres.

**FULLER, WILLIAM** (?–by 1695) IMMIGRATED: in 1651 as a free adult with his family, probably from Virginia. RESIDED: in Broad Neck Hundred, Anne Arundel County; left Maryland probably by 1664; in Barbados by 1671; settled in South Carolina in 1678. MARRIED **Sarah**, daughter of **Nicholas Martiau** (1592–1657), a French Protestant, naturalized in England, who immigrated to Virginia in 1620 as an agent for the earl of **Huntington**, and served as a Virginia burgess in 1632, and as a justice of York County, Virginia, from 1633 to 1657. CHILDREN. SON: **William** (1673–1732), a burgess in South Carolina in 1712. DAUGHTERS: **Elizabeth** (ca. 1655–?), who married (first name unknown) **Cattell**; probably **Maryann**; and probably **Belinda**. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant; Quaker by 1657. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: probably left Virginia because of religious persecution; called a captain at his first appearance in Maryland records; quickly assumed leadership of the Protestant forces in the colony. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Assembly, Providence (Anne Arundel County), 1654; Parliamentary Commission, 1654–1657/58; Lower House, Anne Arundel County, 1658, 1659/60. OTHER PROVINCIAL OFFICES: justice, Provincial Court, 1654–1657/58. governor, 1655; MILITARY OFFICES: captain, 1652–1657/58; commander of an expedition against the Eastern Shore Indians, 1652. OUT OF
