

Piscattaway Parish Vestry, Charles County, 1693–1704. MILITARY SERVICE: captain, 1696–1701. STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES: he supported the revolution of 1689. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 3,811 acres in 1692; 7,684 acres in 1704. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: by April 23, 1711. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £1,428.2.6 sterling (including 29 slaves and 2 servants); FB, £93.2.0. LAND: 6,002 acres in Maryland, plus land in Scotland.

HYLAND, NICHOLAS (?–1774). BORN: in Cecil County, of age by 1739; probably second son. NATIVE: second generation. RESIDED: in Cecil County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: Nicholas Hyland (?–1719), possibly immigrated from Labadun, England. MOTHER: Millicent. BROTHER: Capt. John (1716–1756), who married on April 29, 1739, Martha (?–1766), daughter of *Marmaduke Tilden* (?–1726). NEPHEW: *Stephen Hyland* (1744–1806). MARRIED Elizabeth. CHILDREN. SONS: John (?–by 1765), who married Mary Tilden; Nicholas (1733–1785), who married Margery, daughter of John Kankey and wife Ann; twins Isaac (1735/36–?) and Jacob (1735/36–?); Samson (1742–?); and Michael (1744–?). DAUGHTER: Millicent (1740–?), who married Alexander Williamson. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Anglican, St. Mary Anne's Church, North Elk Parish, Cecil County; favored legislation against "Popish Priests and Jesuits." SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., 1769. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: yeoman. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Cecil County, 1742–1744, 1745, 1745/46–1748, 1750–1751 (elected to the 2nd session to fill vacancy; Arms and Ammunition 2), 1751–1754 (Elections 1–6), 1754–1757 (Elections 1–6; Arms and Ammunition 5, 6), 1757–1758 (Elections 1, Cv, 2; Arms and Ammunition 1, Cv, 2), 1765–1766 (Grievances 2). LOCAL OFFICES: justice, Cecil County, 1740–1774 (quorum, 1749–1774); North Elk Parish Vestry, Cecil County, in office 1743–1748, 1751–1754; justice, Court of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery, Cecil County, commissioned 1752, 1759, 1761, and 1762. MILITARY SERVICE: captain, by 1742; colonel, by 1761. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 1,500 acres in Cecil County (inherited from his father). SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: purchased several small tracts in Cecil County, and deeded 100 acres in Cecil County to his son Nicholas. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: between October 3, 1773, and April 27, 1774, in Cecil County. PER-

SONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £2,507.15.5 current money (including 19 slaves and plate); FB, £2,462.15.4. LAND: ca. 1,600 acres in Cecil County.

HYLAND, STEPHEN (1744–1806). BORN: on December 26, 1744, at "Harmony Hall," North Elk Parish, Cecil County; second son. NATIVE: second or third generation. RESIDED: in North Elk Parish, Cecil County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: Capt. John Hyland (1716–1756), of "Harmony Hall," Cecil County. MOTHER: Martha (?–1766), daughter of *Marmaduke Tilden* (?–1726). UNCLE: Col. *Nicholas Hyland* (?–1774). AUNT: Wealthy Ann Tilden, who married Thomas Hynson, son of *Charles Hynson* (1663–1711). BROTHERS: Nicholas Hyland (1742–?); John (1746–?); Charles (1749–?); and Lambert (1751–?). SISTERS: Rebecca (1739/40–?), who married Josiah Kankey; Millicent (1754–?), who married Capt. John Lord. MARRIED first, in 1774 Rebecca Tilden (?–1775). MARRIED second, in 1777 Araminta, daughter of Dr. Thomas Hamm and wife Ann. CHILDREN. SONS: John (1775–?); Nicholas (1779–?); Jacob; Stephen; and Lambert. DAUGHTERS: Mary; Martha. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Anglican, St. Mary Anne's Church, North Elk Parish, Cecil County. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., 1773; Esq., 1774. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: probably a planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Cecil County, 1773–1774; Conventions, Cecil County, 1st, 1774, 5th, 1775 (elected, but did not attend); Lower House, Cecil County, 1777–1778. OTHER STATE OFFICE: associate justice, Second District, 1789—at least 1791. LOCAL OFFICES: North Elk Parish Vestry, Cecil County, in office 1771–1774, 1779–1791; justice, Cecil County, 1772–1788; justice, Orphans' Court, Cecil County, 1777—at least 1789; sheriff, Cecil County, elected 1779 (not commissioned), 1782 (not commissioned); commissioner of tax, Cecil County, 1783—at least 1786. MILITARY SERVICE: colonel, Thirtieth or Susquehanna Battalion, Cecil County Militia, commissioned September 1778. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. PERSONAL PROPERTY: assessed value £595.0.0, including 11 slaves and 12 oz. plate, 1783. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 1,138 acres in Cecil County. SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: owned 1,261 acres in Cecil County, 1783; purchased 136 acres in Cecil County and 3 lots in Elkton, Cecil County, between 1796 and 1799, but sold this 136 acres and 3 lots between 1799 and 1800. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: administration
