

ship; testified in England against Associators' government, 1690; reappointed to the bench by Gov. *Francis Nicholson* (1655–1727/28). **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: patented 3,745 acres by 1686 and held over 2,500 acres while burgess. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** DIED: will probated on May 17, 1708, in Calvert County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, £743.0.6 (including 1 servant, 13 slaves, and books); FB, £654.11.9, incomplete. **LAND:** at least 2,780 acres.

**LLOYD, EDWARD** (ca. 1620–1696). BORN: ca. 1620, probably in Wales; younger son. IMMIGRATED: in 1650, with wife Frances and son from Lower Norfolk County, Virginia. RESIDED: in Virginia, ca. 1636–1650; Anne Arundel County; Talbot County after ca. 1663; St. Mary's Parish, Whitechapel, Middlesex, England, 1668–death. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** BROTHER: Cornelius (1608–by 1654), a merchant in London by ca. 1635 when he emigrated to Virginia, became a justice, burgess, and colonel in Lower Norfolk County, Virginia, during the 1640s and 1650s, and married Elizabeth Evans. MARRIED first, Alice (?–by 1650), widow of Henry Hawkins, probably the daughter of (first name unknown) Crouch. MARRIED second, by 1650, Frances, widow of John Watkins of Virginia. MARRIED third, Grace (?–1700/1), widow of both Francis Mauldin and *William Parker* (?–1673/74). CHILDREN. SON: *Philemon Lloyd* (1646–1685). STEPSONS: Henry Hawkins (?–1673); John Watkins; Francis Maulden (by 1653–1710/11); and William Parker (?–1679). STEPDAUGHTERS: probably Alice Hawkins (?–1687), who married *Richard Woolman* (?–1681); Grace Mauldin, who married *Henry Múchell* (?–1701); Sarah Parker, who married *John Edmundson* (?–1697/98); Elizabeth Parker; Mary Parker (ca. 1632–1699), who married first, John Hall (?–by 1660), and second, Robert Paca (?–1681); Thomasina Parker; and Dorothy Parker. **PRIVATE CAREER.** EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant; elder of the Independent Church in Virginia. Lloyd was presented before the county court in Virginia in 1649 for not attending the Anglican Church and refusing to hear common prayer. Soon after this he settled at Providence, Anne Arundel County, as one of the leaders of a group of like-minded religious dissenters. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** established one of Maryland's most prominent political families. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** merchant; planter. **PUBLIC CAREER.** LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Parliamentary Commission, 1654–1657/58; Assembly, Provi-

dence (Anne Arundel County), 1654; Lower House, Anne Arundel County, 1658; Upper House, 1659/60, 1661, 1662, 1663–1664, 1666. OTHER PROVINCIAL OFFICES: justice, Provincial Court, 1654–1668; Council, 1658–1668. LOCAL OFFICES: justice, Anne Arundel County, 1650–possibly 1652. MILITARY SERVICE: commander, Anne Arundel County, 1650–1652. OUT OF COLONY SERVICE: burgess, Lower Norfolk County, Virginia, 1644/45, 1646. STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES: Lloyd protested the oath of fidelity to the proprietor, 1653/54, and was an important supporter of the Bennett-Claiborne Commission against proprietary claims in the 1650s. Despite his active role in the commonwealth government, Lloyd gained appointment to the Council in 1658 in recognition of his considerable economic and political influence. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: probably ca. 600 acres in Anne Arundel County. He later patented over 7,300 acres in Anne Arundel, Kent, and Talbot counties, but sold at least 6,000 acres before his death. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** DIED: in 1696, in England. **LAND:** probably ca. 1,500 acres in Maryland.

**LLOYD, EDWARD** (1670–1718/19). BORN: in 1670, in Talbot County; eldest son. NATIVE: third generation. RESIDED: in Talbot County. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** FATHER: *Philemon Lloyd* (1646–1685), son of *Edward Lloyd* (ca. 1620–1696). MOTHER: Henrietta Maria Neale (1647–1697), widow of *Richard Bennett* (ca. 1639–1667), daughter of *James Neale* (ca. 1615–1684). BROTHERS: *Philemon Lloyd* (ca. 1674–1732/33); *James Lloyd* (1679/80–1723). HALF BROTHER: Richard Bennett (1667–1749). SISTERS: Henrietta Maria (1673–1702); Anna Maria (1677–1748), who married *Richard Tilghman* (1672/73–1738/39); Mary (1680–1690); Alice (1681–1744); Elizabeth (?–by 1696); Margaret (1683–1747), who married *Matthew Tilghman Ward* (ca. 1676–1741); and Jane (1685–1690). HALF SISTER: Susannah Maria Bennett (1666–1714), who married first, *John Darnall* (?–1684), and second, *Henry Lowe* (?–1717). NEPHEWS: *Robert Lloyd* (ca. 1712–1770); *Edward Lloyd* (1711–1770); *Richard Lloyd* (ca. 1717–1786); *William Tilghman* (1711–1782); *Edward Tilghman* (1713–1785); *James Tilghman* (1716–1793); *Matthew Tilghman* (1717/18–1790); *Henry Lowe* (?–1721); and *Nicholas Lowe* (?–1728). MARRIED on February 1, ca. 1703, Sarah (1683–1755), daughter of Nehemiah Covington (?–1713) and wife Rebecca Denwood. Sarah was the niece of *Thomas Covington* (?–1708/9). Her brothers
