

PROPERTY: TEV, at least \$6,280.04 current money (including 20 slaves, silver worth \$53, and considerable livestock), but size of entire estate is unknown. LAND: charged with 681 acres in King George and Grub Hundred, Prince George's County, 1808.

MARIARTEE, DANIEL (ca. 1676–ca. 1726/27). BORN: ca. 1676, almost definitely in Anne Arundel County; probably elder son. NATIVE: second generation. RESIDED: in Anne Arundel County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: Edward Mariartee (?–1688), who immigrated by 1676; a planter. MOTHER: Honor (?–1701). BROTHER: Edward (?–1718), who married ca. 1705 Rachell Grey. SISTERS: Margaret, who married *Thomas Sprigg* (by 1670–by 1739); Elizabeth (?–1725), who married first, Richard Clarke, and second, Robert Levitt; and Rachel, who married in 1701/2 Benjamin Lawrence. MARRIED Elinor, probably the daughter of *Ninian Beale* (ca. 1625–1717/18). CHILDREN. SONS: Ninian (1701–1748/49), who married in 1735 Jane Griffin; Arden (baptized 1711/12–?); and Thomas (1711–1711). DAUGHTERS: Elinor (ca. 1704–?); Ann (1707/8–?); and Margaret. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: sons held no known offices. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: merchant, probably factor for Arden Carleton, merchant of London; planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Anne Arundel County, 1708A, 1708B–1711 (Elections 4), 1712–1714 (Aggrievances 1–4), 1715 (Aggrievances), 1716–1718 (Aggrievances 1–3), 1719–1721/22 (Aggrievances 1–5), 1724 (elected to the 3rd session of the 1722–1724 Assembly). LOCAL OFFICES: justice, Anne Arundel County, 1704, 1708–1715, 1718–1720/21, 1721–1722, 1722–at least 1723 (no records 1723–1727) (quorum, 1713/14, chief justice 1714–1715, 1718–1720/21, 1721–1722, 1722–at least 1723); justice, Court of Oyer and Terminer, Anne Arundel County, appointed 1718, 1720; sheriff, Anne Arundel County, appointed 1726. MILITARY SERVICE: captain, by 1711/12. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: probably 1,000 acres in Prince George's County (700 acres from wife's father, 1698, and probably 300 acres as wife's dower). SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: purchased 200 acres in Anne Arundel County with *Richard Jones* (ca. 1671–1714), 1709; sold 700 acres in Prince George's County, 1720, and 200 acres in Anne Arundel County, 1721; purchased 88 acres in Anne

Arundel County shortly before death. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: will probated on February 21, 1726/27, in Anne Arundel County. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £168.2.4 current money (including 13 slaves, 9 of whom were mortgaged and not valued in the inventory); FB, £10.9.2 current money. LAND: 388 acres in Prince George's and Anne Arundel counties.

MARSH, PAUL (?–1684). IMMIGRATED: in 1664 as a free adult. RESIDED: in Anne Arundel County by 1668; in Somerset County by 1670; Sussex County, Delaware, by 1680. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: probably Protestant. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., by 1666. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter. ADDITIONAL COMMENT: a land record in 1678 noted that “through poverty, he is enforced to work in the ground.” PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Somerset County, 1671–1674/75. MILITARY SERVICE: captain, 1669/70—at least 1679. STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES: unable to purchase the rights to his 1,000 acres in Somerset County because of his impoverished state, Marsh was granted those 1,000 acres for faithful service to the proprietor, 1678. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 150 acres in St. Mary's County; 200 acres in Somerset County, plus warrants on an additional 1,000 acres in Somerset County. SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: patented 1,000 acres in Somerset County in November 1678; sold the same 1,000 acres in December 1678. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: in 1684 in Sussex County, Delaware. LAND: possibly 150 acres in St. Mary's County and 200 acres in Somerset County.

MARSH, THOMAS (ca. 1615–ca. 1656). BORN: ca. 1615, probably in England. IMMIGRATED: in 1648/49 as a free adult with wife Margaret and children from Virginia. RESIDED: in Lower Norfolk County, Virginia, 1637–1648/49; Broad Neck Hundred, Anne Arundel County, 1649–death. MARRIED first, Margaret Harford. MARRIED second, Sarah (last name possibly Pitt). CHILDREN. SON: *Thomas Marsh* (ca. 1643–1679). DAUGHTERS: Elizabeth (?–1684), who married Thomas Taylor (?–1684/85); Margaret, who married first, Richard (?–by 1669), son of *Richard Preston* (ca. 1618–ca. 1669/70), and second, *William Berry* (ca. 1636–1691). PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant. Marsh gave bond for *William Durand* (?–1672), an elder of the Independent Church in Virginia, and left
