

MOTHER: Sarah Winters. **BROTHERS:** John (1731–?), who married Ruth; Joseph (1743–?); Benjamin (1747–1795), a major in the Revolutionary War, who married in 1776 Rebecca, daughter of Peter Stilley; William (1751–?); James (1753–?); and George. **SISTERS:** Mary (1735–?), who married Peter Butler (?–by 1756); Sarah (1739–?); and Eleanor (1741–?). **MARRIED** by 1775 Sibilla (1754–?), daughter of Thomas Schley (1712–1790), who immigrated from Mertzheim, Germany, and was the first teacher in the Evangelical Reformed Church of Frederick County, and his wife Margaret Wintz (?–1790). Her brother was John Jacob (1751–?). Her sisters were Marie Margaret (1746–?); Eva Catherine (1749–?). **CHILDREN.** **SONS:** Thomas Schley (1775–after 1790); Joseph (ca. 1779–by 1781); Joseph (ca. 1781–?); John (1784–after 1790); and George (1787–1788). **DAUGHTERS:** Elizabeth (ca. 1777–?); Maria (1787–after 1790); and Margaret (?–after 1790). **PRIVATE CAREER.** EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Lutheran, Evangelical Reformed Church, Frederick County; his father was Anglican and a member of All Saints' Parish, Frederick County. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: farmer. **PUBLIC CAREER.** LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Frederick County, 1782–1783 (Laws to Expire 1, 2), 1783 (Laws to Expire). LOCAL OFFICE: Committee of Observation, Frederick County, elected 1775. STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES: lent the State of Maryland \$600 for the war effort, June 20, 1780. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** PERSONAL PROPERTY: assessed value £300.0.0, including 4 slaves, Frederick Town Hundred, Frederick County, 1782; 1 slave, 1790. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 300 acres in Frederick County (inherited from his father), and lots 54 and 95 in Frederick Town. SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: purchased from two of his brothers 278 acres in Frederick County, 1785, 1786; purchased as confiscated British property lot 7 in Frederick Town, 1781. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** DIED: will probated November 18, 1790, in Frederick County. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £203.12.10 current money (including 1 slave, 52 oz. plate, and books); FB, estate overpaid £12.7.3. LAND: 578-acre dwelling plantation, including a mill, and at least 1 lot in Frederick Town. This property was sold in 1794 to pay his creditors, but it was insufficient to fully pay his debts.

OGLIVIE, JOHN (?–1797). RESIDED: in East Nottingham, Cecil County. **MARRIED** Agness.

CHILDREN. **SONS:** Joseph; John. **DAUGHTERS:** Judith; Mary; Sarah; Margaret; and Ann. **PRIVATE CAREER.** EDUCATION: literate. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Esq., by 1784. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: called yeoman, 1784. **PUBLIC CAREER.** LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Cecil County, 1784, 1785. LOCAL OFFICES: assessor, Third District, Cecil County, in office 1783. MILITARY SERVICE: captain, Cecil County Militia, by April 1776; captain, Maryland Battalion of the Flying Camp, July–December 1776; captain, Elk Battalion, Cecil County Militia, 1778–1781. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** PERSONAL PROPERTY: 2 slaves, 1790. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: no evidence of land ownership. SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: bought 578 acres in Cecil County, 1784–1796; sold 134 acres in Cecil County, 1788–1796. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** DIED: will probated on January 10, 1797, in Cecil County. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £549.11.3 current money (including 2 slaves); FB, estate overpaid £203.13.11. LAND: 444 acres in Cecil County.

OLDHAM, EDWARD (1709–1773). BORN: on August 9, 1709, at 1:30 in the morning in Oxford, Talbot County; only son. NATIVE: probably second generation. RESIDED: in Talbot County. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** FATHER: *John Oldham* (?–1729). MOTHER: Mary. SISTERS: Hannah (ca. 1702–1759), who married second, *James Edge* (ca. 1710–1757); Elizabeth (1704–?); Mary (ca. 1707–?); and Martha. **MARRIED** first, on May 29, 1735, Mary (?–by 1739), daughter of Nicholas Lowe (1697–1745) and wife Margaret Turbutt (?–1756). Mary was the granddaughter of *Nicholas Lowe* (ca. 1662–1714). She was the niece of *William Turbutt* (1683/84–1739); *Foster Turbutt* (1679–1720/21); and Mary Lowe (1691–?), who married third, *Thomas Bozeman* (ca. 1693–1752). Her first cousins were Elizabeth Allen (by 1705–by 1757), who married *William Thomas* (1705–1767); Ann Wright (?–1754), who married *Edward Oldham* (1709–1773); *Thomas Wright* (?–ca. 1784); Mary Ann Wright (?–1747), who married *William Hopper* (1707–1772); Mary Coursey, who married *Solomon Wright* (?–1729); Elizabeth Coursey, who married *Thomas Wilkinson* (1700/1–ca. 1758); Anna Maria Turbutt, who married *Edward Tilghman* (1713–1785); Elizabeth Turbutt (?–ca. 1760), who married *Thomas Harris* (?–1760); Elizabeth Turbutt (ca. 1708–?), who married *Tench Francis* (1701–1758); Anne Turbutt (1715–1766), who married *John*
