

WAUGHOP, JAMES (?–ca. 1750). BORN: probably in St. Mary's County. NATIVE: third generation. RESIDED: in St. Mary's County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: *Thomas Waughop* (ca. 1659–1700). STEPFATHER: Thomas Palmer of St. Mary's County. MOTHER: Katherine Coustaneau (?–ca. 1726). BROTHERS: John; *Thomas Waughop* (?–1735). SISTERS: Ann; Katherine. MARRIED Mary. CHILDREN. SONS: Thomas Palmer; William Coustaneau; and James (?–1781). DAUGHTERS: Katherine; Eleanor. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., by 1742. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, St. Mary's County, 1735/36–1737 (elected to the Convention of the 1734/35–1737 Assembly to fill vacancy), 1738, 1739–1741, 1742–1744. LOCAL OFFICES: justice, St. Mary's County, 1736–at least 1749 (quorum, 1746–at least 1749); coroner, St. Mary's County, appointed 1737 and 1742. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: at least 340 acres in St. Mary's County (inherited from his mother ca. 1726); had previously sold 900 acres in St. Mary's and Worcester counties acquired through inheritance and purchase. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: ca. 1750 in St. Mary's County. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £523.15.10 (including 20 slaves and books); FB £7.15.6. LAND: at least 340 acres in St. Mary's County.

WAUGHOP (WAHOP, WAGHOP), THOMAS (ca. 1659–1700). BORN: ca. 1659, in St. Mary's County. NATIVE: second generation. RESIDED: in St. Mary's County (in St. George's Hundred by 1684, later moved to St. Mary's City). FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: John Waughop (?–1677/78), who immigrated by 1654; planter of “Piney Point” by 1658; owned at least 800 acres; illiterate. MOTHER: Jane (Joane), widow of John Gosse. SISTERS: Elizabeth, who married Thomas (ca. 1642/43–1675), son of *Thomas Hatton* (?–1654/55); Rebecca, who married James Jones of Northumberland County, Virginia; and Frances, who married Henry Hyde. MARRIED Katherine (?–ca. 1726), daughter of John Coustaneau of Virginia. She subsequently married Thomas Palmer of St. Mary's County. CHILDREN. SONS: John; *James Waughop* (?–ca. 1750); and *Thomas Waughop* (?–1735). DAUGHTERS: Ann; Katherine, who married William Canady, stepson of *William Watts* (1660–1723/24). PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: probably literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant. OCCUPATIONAL PRO-

FILE: planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, St. Mary's City, 1694–1697, 1697/98–1700. LOCAL OFFICES: alderman, St. Mary's City, 1689; councilman, St. Mary's City, 1694; justice, St. Mary's County, 1694–1700 (quorum, 1696–1700); coroner, St. Mary's County, 1694. MILITARY SERVICE: captain, 1694–1700. STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES: supported the Protestant Associates' Revolution in 1689. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: at least 800 acres. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: administration bond dated December 21, 1700, in St. Mary's County. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £59.8.4; FB, estate overpaid £36.4.0. LAND: at least 800 acres.

WAUGHOP, THOMAS (?–1735). BORN: probably in St. Mary's County. NATIVE: third generation. RESIDED: in St. Mary's County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: *Thomas Waughop* (ca. 1659–1700). STEPFATHER: Thomas Palmer of St. Mary's County. MOTHER: Katherine Coustaneau (?–ca. 1726). BROTHERS: John; *James Waughop* (?–ca. 1750). SISTERS: Ann; Katherine. MARRIED first, by 1719, Mary, daughter of *Peter Watts* (by 1675–1719). Her sister (first name unknown) married *George Clarke*, (ca. 1692–1753) the son of *Philip Clarke* (?–1699). MARRIED second, Katherine. CHILDREN. SON: Thomas (?–ca. 1733). DAUGHTERS: Johanna (Joann), who married Robert Graves; Ann, who married *Robert Chesley* (?–1768); Katherine; Elizabeth; and Mary, who married (first name unknown) Gwyther. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., 1725. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, St. Mary's County, 1716–1718, 1719–1721/22, 1722–1724, 1725–1727, 1728–1731, 1732–1734, 1734/35–1737 (died during first session). LOCAL OFFICES: school visitor, St. Mary's County, appointed 1723; justice, St. Mary's County, 1723–at least 1733 (quorum, 1727–at least 1733); commissioner to buy land for the laying out of Leonardtown, appointed 1728. MILITARY SERVICE: captain, by 1727. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: patented 138 acres in St. Mary's County, 1725; acquired 750 acres in St. Mary's County (probably inherited ca. 1726). WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: between April 1 and April 7, 1735, in St. Mary's County. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £296.16.0 (including 4
