HON. O. E. WELLER

The Republican Party has nominated the above named gentleman for Senatorial honors to represent the State of Maryland in the United States Senate in the National Capitol. Mr. Weller is a man of wide experience, gained through training and travel. He is a graduate of the Naval Academy—a lawyer, banker, financier and a man of affairs. He is a Marylander by birth and therefore well versed in the needs of the State and the people of the State. Mr. Weller was forced to quit the activity of a business career on account of ill health but not before he had acquired a competency which placed him beyond the reach of want and financial embarassment.
