Bishop John Hurst of the A. M. E. Church, who spent five weeks this year visiting his birthplace in Haiti. He found the natives there suffering under the rule of the U. S. Marines, who have taken their land and ports.

Bishop Hurst advocates sending colored troops to Haiti to replace marines; appointment of a colored commission to Haiti and gradual restoration of Haitian sovereignty.
