

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill authorising the drawing of a lottery to defray the expence of building a masonic hall in the city of Baltimore, endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The additional supplement to an act for the relief of creditors, and to prevent frauds and deceits occasioned by secret sales, and mortgages and gifts, of goods and chattels, and the bill to restrain the evil practices arising from negroes keeping dogs, and to prohibit negroes or mulattoes from carrying guns or offensive weapons, endorsed, "will not pass." And the following resolution:

By the SENATE, January 26, 1806.

RESOLVED, That the executive of this state be directed to postpone the sale of the following tracts of land, claimed by a certain Ariana French, until the chancellor shall decide between the said Ariana French and the state of Maryland, to wit: Chance, containing one hundred and forty acres; Choice, seventy-six acres; Property, one hundred and sixty-eight acres; Tit for Tat, seventy-three acres; Blooming Plains, nine hundred and seventy-seven acres; Durham, three hundred and eighty-four acres; Rising Sun, two hundred and twenty-five acres; Tom's Venture, ninety-two acres, and Homony Isle, one hundred and one acres; provided the said Ariana French, her heirs or assigns, shall make application to the chancellor of this state, according to law, on or before the first day of November next.

Which was read the first and second time by especial order and assented to.

Mr. Montgomery, from the committee, delivers to the speaker the following report:

THE committee to whom were referred the resolutions of the legislature of North-Carolina, beg leave to submit the following resolutions:

RESOLVED, That our senators in the congress of the United States be instructed, and our representatives requested, to take all legal and necessary steps, to use their utmost exertions, as soon as the same is practicable, to obtain an amendment of the federal constitution, so as to authorise and empower the congress of the United States to pass a law, whenever they may deem it expedient, to prevent the further importation of slaves from any of the West-India islands, from the coast of Africa, or elsewhere, into the United States, or any part thereof.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the governor be and he is hereby requested to transmit copies of the foregoing resolution to our senators and representatives in congress, also to the executives of all the different states in the union, with a request that the same may be laid before their respective legislatures for their concurrence and adoption.
