Mr. Baer, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act authorising repairs to the old, or the erection of a new, gaol in Frederick-town, in Frederick county; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Bland, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to establish a permanent salary for the chief justice of the court of oyer and terminer and gaol delivery for Baltimore county; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On the second reading of the message to the senate relative to the appointment of a senator in the senate of the United States, the question was put, That the whole of the message from the word "consideration" be stricken out, for the purpose of inserting the words "and being firmly persuaded, that the present critical situation of the United States, and the interest of this state, demand that a senator should be elected, we agree to-morrow to go into the election of a senator from this state to the United States, agreeably to the proposal contained in your message?"
