

*Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That the Comptroller of the State of Maryland and any disbursement officer of any agency, board or commission of this State be requested to refuse final payment to any NONRESIDENT GENERAL ROADS CONTRACTOR, BUILDING CONTRACTOR OR PRIME CONTRACTOR, contractor for any work completed on any project, payable by the State from monies appropriated in the State Budget or Capital Improvement Program unless the Comptroller or disbursement officer receives a certification that such contractor has paid any and all permit fees, sales taxes, withholding taxes, income taxes, excise taxes or other taxes imposed under the laws of this State or any political subdivision thereof which are incurred, imposed or due in connection with said projects; and be it further

*Resolved*, That the Secretary of State be instructed to send copies of this resolution to the Comptroller, the Board of Public Works, the State Budget Director, the State Roads Commission and the Maryland Port Authority.

Senate Joint Resolution expressing deepest regrets over the untimely passing of the Honorable James Weinroth, Senator from Cecil County.
