## AMENDMENTS TO SENATE BILL NO. 1

By Senator Clark:

Amendment No. 1—In line 4 of Section 42E on page 4 of the printed bill strike out the following:

"forty-eight (48)" and insert in lieu thereof the following: "forty (40);" and in line 6 strike out the following: "six (6)" and insert in lieu thereof the following: "five (5)."

Amendment No. 2—Following line 34 of Section 42E on page 5 of the printed bill add the following:

"(i-1) Each State Senatorial District enumerated in subsections (b) through (i) above shall be divided from time to time into six subdistricts, each of which shall elect one Senator. All Senators shall be residents of and elected from their respective subdistrict and they shall not be elected from the entire Senatorial District. The subdistricts for the election of Senators shall be established as provided herein, shall be based substantially upon population and shall be as compact and contiguous as reasonably possible. The boundaries of the subdistricts of all Senatorial Districts shall be fixed by Resolution of the Senate of Maryland, but any such resolution shall not affect the election, tenure, powers or duties of Senators in office at the time a Resolution is
