Mr. Frazier, chairman of same committee, also reported a bill, entitled an act to divorce Josephine Hawke, of the city of Annapolis, from her husband, Richard James Hawke;

Mr. Tuck, chairman of the committee on grievances and courts of justice, reported a bill, entitled a further supplement to an act, entitled an act for quieting possessions, enrolling conveyances, and securing the estates of purchasers;

Mr. Tuck, chairman of same committee, also reported a bill, entitled an act for the relief of lunatic paupers;

Also, reported a bill, entitled an act to prescribe notice of surveys in the cases therein mentioned;

Also, reported a bill, entitled an act to repeal certain portions of the act passed at December session 1830, chapter 185, entitled an act to prevent unnecessary expense and delay in prosecuting appeals from courts exercising equity jurisdiction in this State; and

Mr. Jones, of Somerset, reported a bill, entitled an additional supplement to the act, entitled an act for the more effectual protection of public worship in this State, passed at December session 1824, ch. 53;

Which were severally read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. William Lynch, from the committee on divorces, made an unfavorable report upon the petition of Levin T. Fisher, of Dorchester county, praying for a divorce;

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The hour having arrived for taking up the order of the day, the house again resolved itself into a committee of the whole house upon the unfinished order of yesterday, being the bill reported by Mr. Bowie, chairman of the committee on ways and means, entitled an act for the general valuation and assessment of property in this state, and to provide a tax to pay the debts of the state; (Mr. Jones, of Somerset, being in the chair,) and after some time spent in committee, the Speaker resumed the chair, and the chairman reported, that the said committee had, in obedience to order, had said bill again under consideration, and having made some progress therein, had directed him to ask leave to sit again:

Which leave was granted by the house.
