

MONDAY, February 10th, 1845.

The House met. Present at the call of the roll the following members.

Messrs. Chapman, (Speaker,) Ford, of St. Mary's, Thomas, Worthington, of A. A., Johnson, of A. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The Speaker laid before the House a report from the clerk of St. Mary's county court, and the registers of wills of St. Mary's and Charles counties, in obedience to the order of the House of Delegates of the 29th ultimo;

Which were severally read and referred to the committee on Ways and Means.

The Speaker also laid before the House a communication from his Excellency the Governor, transmitting resolutions of the Legislature of the State of Vermont, on the subject of slavery, the tariff of 1842, and the distribution of the proceeds of the public lands;

Which was read, and

With the resolutions enclosed therein, referred to the committee on Federal Relations.

Mr. Harrington presented the petition of Robert A. Dodson, and sundry other members of the St. Michael's Beneficial Society, praying for an act of incorporation;

Which was read and referred to the committee on Corporations.

Mr. Raymond presented the memorial of sundry citizens of Carroll county, praying for a lottery to aid in completing a road from Westminster to Emmittsburg;

Which was read and referred to the committee on Lotteries.

Mr. Potter submitted the following resolution:

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That our Senators and Representatives in Congress, be requested to make every exertion within their power, to secure the passage of a bill reported to the 27th Congress, entitled, a bill "to form a military asylum for the relief and support of invalid soldiers of the army of the United States," which was recommended to the favorable consideration of Congress, upon a plan submitted by Captain Anderson of the United States Army;

Which was read the first, and by a special order the second time, "assented to," and sent to the Senate.
