Mr. Thomas, chairman of the committee on Inspections, reported a bill entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, an act for regulating the inspection of green hides and skins in the city of Baltimore;

Mr. Potter reported a bill entitled, an act to constitute school No. 1, of the middle election district of Caroline county, a primary school, and

Mr. Stansbury, of Baltimore county, reported a bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Camp meeting Committee of Great-Falls circuit

Which were severally read the first and by a special order the second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Hopewell, chairman of the committee on Pensions and Revolutionary Claims, made favorable reports upon the petitions of Elizabeth Green and Margaret Staples, severally praying to be placed on the pension roll, accompanied with the following resolutions:

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Treasurer of the State pay out of any unappropriated money in the Treasury, to Elizabeth Green, widow of Henry Green, a soldier of the Revolution, in quarterly payments, the half pay of a private, in consideration of her husband's services in the war of the Revolution.

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Treasurer of the State, pay out of any unappropriated money in the Treasury, to Margaret Staples, the widow of John Staples, a soldier of the Revolution, in quarterly payments, the half pay of a sergeant, in consideration of her husband's services in the war of the Revolution.

Which were severally read the first and by a special order the second time, the reports concurred in, and the resolutions therein contained severally assented to and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Hollyday, of Cecil, from the majority of the committee on Crimes and Punishments, made an unfavorable report upon the memorial of sundry citizens of Cecil county, praying for the abolishment of capital punishments within this State;

Which was read.

Mr. Shriver from the minority of said committee, gave notice that he dissented from the report of the majority;

The said unfavorable report was then read the second time and concurred in.

Mr. Calvert, chairman of the committee on Lotteries, made unfavorable reports on the following memorials:
