(House Joint Resolution 67)

House Joint Resolution requesting the Governor to appoint a commission of five members to make an economic analysis of the county dispensary system in Kent County and to make this report available to the Board of County Commissioners and the public.

WHEREAS, Kent County has experienced significant changes in recent years by way of increased population and otherwise, and is on the threshold of even more changes in the name of progress; and

WHEREAS, An ever-increasing financial burden is being placed upon the counties to adequately meet the pressing demands of local government and its intensifying complexity; and

WHEREAS, Many citizens question whether the county derives the greatest monetary benefit from the county liquor dispensary system and their absolute monopoly of the sale and distribution of alcoholic beverages; now, therefore, be it

*Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Governor appoint a commission to make a detailed economic analysis of the county liquor dispensary system in Kent County to determine the feasibility of continuing it and to make a report, including its recommendations, to the Board of County Commissioners and to make its report available to the public; and, be it further*

*Resolved, That this commission include the manager of the Kent County Liquor Control Board, one County Commissioner for Kent County, one member of the Kent County Alcoholic Beverage Association, and two members of the general public from Kent County; and, be it further*

*Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to each County Commissioner of Kent County and to the members of the Kent County Liquor Control Board.*

(House Joint Resolution 69)

House Joint Resolution requesting the re-activation of the 1967 committee which studied the alcoholic beverage laws of Caroline County.

WHEREAS, On May 4, 1967, House Joint Resolution 52 was approved, which resulted in the appointment of a Study Committee which reviewed the alcoholic beverage laws of Caroline County; and

WHEREAS, The report of said committee recommended, among other things, that the County Dispensing System be abolished in Caroline County; now, therefore, be it
