Ques. Have you yourself at any time in conversation with any one whomsoever justified or apologized for the course of the States in rebellion, expressed a wish for their success or your sympathy with them.

Ans. I can say that I have never sympathized with the rebellion. I have always condemned secession. But I have sympathized with some individuals in the South. I have friends in both armies, the most of whom are in the Union army.

Question marked thus X.

Ans. It looks to me as if that was disloyal.
