To the Honorable, JOHN S. BERRY,

Speaker of the House of Delegates of Maryland.

Sir:—In obedience to an order passed your Honorable Body, I report to the House of Delegates, “a Tabular Statement of the returns made by Notaries Public of the city of Baltimore, for the years 1854, 1855, 1856, 1857, 1858, 1859, 1860 and 1861.”

The Statement now given, embraces all the information required by you, which this office will afford.

The returns of the notaries, did not distinguish, as between protests on notes, protests on bills of exchange and protests on drafts, nor am I aware of any law which requires them so to do.

There are neither papers, nor entries in the books of this office, showing that “an allowance has been made for expenses incident to the transacting of the business of the office of Notary Public in said city,” in the case of any Notary. But there are accounts of Notaries, and returns made by several of them, which show them indebted to the Treasury and which will require the attention of this department.
