Mr. Creswell presented the petition of Joseph R. Brown, and one hundred and seventy-five others, citizens of Cecil county, praying that compensation may be made Matthew C. Pearce, for the loss sustained by him by the hanging of his negro;

Mr. Johnson, of Baltimore county, presented the petition of John Slack and others, trustees of the Union Academy of Baltimore county, praying the passage of a law for the sale of certain property;

Which was read and referred to the Baltimore county delegation.

The Honorable, the Speaker, presented a statement of the affairs of the Washington and Baltimore Turnpike Company for the past two years, by W. Ball;
