## PREFACE

This check list of Maryland imprints for the year 1839 is part of a research project aiming at the compilation of a complete national bibliography which was instituted some years ago by the American Imprints Inventory.

The Maryland files of the American Imprints Inventory, now held by the Union Catalog Division of the Library of Congress, were used as a basic source for the check list. In most instances, the vast resources of the Library of Congress provided full bibliographic information for the check list entries. However, visits to the Maryland Historical Society and the Enoch Pratt Free Library in Baltimore, as well as correspondence with more distant libraries, were required in a number of cases where necessary information was lacking in the Library of Congress.

A brief sketch of social, political and economic conditions in Maryland in the 1830's, and a survey of printing and publishing in the State during this period are presented in the hope that they will prove helpful as background information for the user of the check list.

Entries in the check list are arranged alphabetically by author. The present location of each imprint is given by means of symbols assigned by the Union Catalog Division of the Library of Congress.

The preparation of this study was greatly facilitated by the invaluable advice and assistance of Miss May Gardner of the Union Catalog Division of the Library of Congress, to whom grateful acknowledgment is made.

## I. INTRODUCTION: HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

### A. Maryland in the 1830's

Urbanization and industrialization increasingly characterized the United States in the 1830's. The number of persons engaged in manufactures increased 127 per cent between 1820 and 1840, while agricultural labor increased only 79 per cent.<sup>1</sup> The number of city dwellers rose similarly. In 1820, less than a twentieth of the nation lived in communities of eight thousand or over, but two decades later more than a twelfth lived in such places, and more than a ninth in towns larger than two thousand.<sup>2</sup> The new economic life acquired its appropriate institutions. From the start of the century, first in banking and insurance, then in transportation, canals, bridges, turnpikes, then in manufacturing, the corporation was gradually becoming the dominant form of economic organization.

Maryland in the 1830's reflected these national trends to a marked degree. Economic expansion might be said to be the keynote of this period in the history of the State. The center of Maryland's bustling economic activity was, of course, the city of Baltimore. In 1830, this thriving metropolis on the Chesapeake stood second only to

New York in population, 80,000 to New York's 202,589.<sup>3</sup> By 1840, Baltimore's population had grown to 102,509,<sup>4</sup> nearly a quarter of the total population of the State.<sup>5</sup> Unfortunately, Maryland's economic expansion in the 1830's led to over expansion and wild speculation, followed by a long depression beginning in 1837 which arrested for some years the development of the state's industry and commerce.

The beginnings of the factory system in Maryland had been evident by 1795. Baltimoreans quickly seized the opportunities offered by the invention of the power loom and the cotton gin, and as early as 1820 the city had some 20,000 spindles humming in half a dozen cotton mills.<sup>6</sup>

Baltimore had long been a leading port, and by the 1830's its famous "Baltimore Clippers" were the carriers of a vigorous foreign trade. The principal export was flour. With abundant water power and easy access to large wheat-growing areas, Baltimore became one of the largest milling centers in the country; in 1825 there were some sixty mills within a few miles of the city.<sup>7</sup> The soft flour produced was found especially well suited to tropical conditions, and this advantage, combined with its advantages of position, made Baltimore the largest exporter of flour to West Indian and South American ports. Returning vessels brought coffee from Brazil and guano from Peru. The

latter commodity was first introduced to this country through Baltimore in 1824; the demand for it was greatest in the southern states, and until the Civil War Baltimore enjoyed a monopoly in its importation and distribution.<sup>8</sup>

The people of Maryland, or their chosen representatives, from the period of the American Revolution had shown eagerness to lend aid to every undertaking which aimed to encourage and promote the internal resources of the State. The industrial leaders of Maryland were determined to avail themselves of their natural geographic position to gain a fair share of the internal trade of the country; the statements issued under the auspices of Maryland business interests of the first half of the nineteenth century offer a striking analogy to the reports of modern chambers of commerce. The three projects that especially concerned the people of Maryland were the Cumberland Road, the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, and the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, all of which were to connect the East with the newly settled lands west of the Ohio River. Other important undertakings of this nature during the same period were the digging of the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal, by which the two great bays were linked, and the organization and building of the Baltimore and Susquehanna Railroad, which was to bring the products of the Pennsylvania towns of York, Lancaster and Harrisburg, and of the whole Susquehanna Valley to Baltimore by the new mechanical means.

Baltimoreans had played a vigorous part in obtaining Federal funds to build the Cumberland Road, the first across the mountains to

the West, on which work had begun in 1811.<sup>9</sup> In addition, improvements were made on the road between Baltimore and Cumberland to draw the trade to and from the new settlements beyond the mountains. However, the completion of the Erie Canal in 1825 cut deeply into this western trade, and Baltimore merchants became much concerned to find a means of recovering their advantage. While canal and steamboat transportation was setting New York and Pennsylvania wild, the more far-sighted citizens of Baltimore were attracted by the possibilities of lines of rails upon which heavy loads of freight could be transported with a minimum of difficulty. At a meeting in February, 1827 at the home of the banker, George Brown, a committee was appointed to determine whether a railroad would be practicable. The committee reported favorably, and a charter incorporating the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company was obtained from the legislature on February 28.<sup>10</sup> The founding of what was to be the first successful railroad in America was probably the most decisive event in the city's history as well as a tremendous step in the westward expansion of the United States, making possible the development of vast stretches of territory hitherto inaccessible and far removed from the waterways.

Although the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company sent a commission to England to study that country's railways, particularly their steam locomotives, and despite the commission's favorable report on the latter's practical value, the railroad at first used horse-power. The first section of track, six-and-a-half miles between a depot on Pratt Street and the Carrollton Viaduct, was completed in

December, 1829. This viaduct, the first railroad bridge in Maryland, was built so solidly that heavy locomotives and long freight trains still cross it regularly. By May, 1830, the railroad had reached Ellicott's Mills, more than thirteen miles from Baltimore. Point of Rocks, sixty-nine miles from the city, became the terminus in 1832.<sup>11</sup>

Meanwhile, the Baltimore and Ohio was making valuable experiments in the construction of rolling stock and in the application of motive power. In 1829, Peter Cooper, a New Yorker who had settled in Baltimore, produced the Tom Thumb, a tiny locomotive weighing only a ton, and traveling eighty miles on a ton of coal. Its efficiency was demonstrated after some difficulty, when Cooper raced it with a horse-drawn car on rails; although the horse car came in first, the directors of the railroad were sufficiently convinced by Cooper's demonstration to advertise a competitive test for the most useful steam locomotive. In 1830, the Tom Thumb made its first run to Ellicott's Mills.<sup>12</sup>

In July, 1831, the York, built by Davis and Gartner of York, Pennsylvania, was delivered to the Baltimore and Ohio, and placed in service between Ellicott's Mills and Baltimore. It was shortly followed by the Atlantic and the Traveller. The first passenger cars were modeled after stagecoaches, with baggage space on top. In 1833, Ross Winans, who invented the camel-back engine, built special baggage cars and eight-wheeled coaches to carry sixty passengers. In the same year, the Baltimore and Ohio erected works which later became the Mount Clare shops, and also extended a branch to Washington to tap the southern market. Extending its rails westward, the Baltimore and Ohio

reached Cumberland in 1842, and finally in 1852 the Ohio River at Wheeling. By comparison, the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, begun the same year as the railroad, did not reach Cumberland until 1850.<sup>13</sup>

The 1830's brought the culmination of an era of wild speculation in canals, railroads and public lands in Maryland. Carried away by the vision of a seemingly unlimited expansion of commerce, Maryland entered upon an extravagant policy of public improvements, and subscribed for many millions of stock of railroads and canals, raising the funds by loans at home and abroad, and pledging the credit of the State for both principal and interest. The first sign of the impending crash was the failure of the Bank of Maryland and two rural banks in 1834. Receivers of the Bank of Maryland made no report for seventeen months; agitation over the matter resulted in five days of rioting.<sup>14</sup> After the great national financial crisis of 1837, when the whole country seemed about to be plunged into bankruptcy, Maryland found herself unable to meet her obligations, and was temporarily driven to the extremity of suspending the payment of interest to her creditors. It was not until the governorship of Thomas George Pratt (1845-1848) that increased taxation and greater economy in expenditure finally enabled the State to resume payment of interest, and to pay off all arrears.<sup>15</sup>

The year 1833 saw the formation of the first Maryland labor organization, when the Union Trade Society was founded in Baltimore. The organization was one of the first central trades unions in the United States, with seventeen trades actively participating. Acting

with the workingmen of Washington in that same year, the labor organizations of Baltimore had demanded a ten-hour day fully two years before the demand became general throughout the country. By 1834, Baltimore had become a leading trade union center with 3,500 members in numerous trades, including one of the first societies of women needleworkers in America.<sup>16</sup>

Strides were made in the field of public education in Maryland, especially in Baltimore, during the decade under consideration. A law calling for the establishment of public primary schools had been passed by the Maryland legislature in 1825;<sup>17</sup> this measure is of interest as marking the acceptance by the State of the principles of modern public education rather than as directly accomplishing much in educating the youth of the period. Although a State educational system was not fully realized until the period of the Civil War, the duty of providing primary schools throughout the State at least had been recognized, and many efforts were made to fulfill it in the ensuing decades.

An ordinance was passed in Baltimore in 1828 calling for the establishment of six male and six female schools. Adequate funds were not provided, however, and at the date of the first report in 1829 only two schools for males and one for females had been established.<sup>18</sup> By 1834, the number of pupils in all the schools was 859, but during the course of the next four years this number was reduced to 675, the panic of 1837 no doubt contributing its share in bringing about this

depressed condition. The year 1839 saw an enrollment of 1,126 pupils.<sup>19</sup>

It was also in 1839 that Baltimore's first public high school was established, an event that gave a strong impetus to the development of the city's public education system. An ordinance passed on March 7, 1839 called upon the school commissioners to establish an institution "in which the higher branches of English and classical literature only should be taught".<sup>20</sup> Called at first simply the High School, the school opened on October 20, 1839 with forty-six students.<sup>21</sup>

Among the most difficult problems arising in the United States during the early decades of the nineteenth century was that of how best to cope with the rapidly increasing free Negro population. The prevailing opinion in every part of the Union was that the free Negro would permanently remain in a degraded state, and thus would constitute a growing danger to society. Among the various solutions proposed, the one to which non-extremist leaders of thought, both Northern and Southern, turned was that of colonization. The free Negro would be transported to the land whence his fathers came; slaveholders could then safely and gradually emancipate their slaves, and the whole Negro problem would be solved.

The result was the organization of the American Colonization Society on January 1, 1817, the object of the organization being "to promote and execute a plan for colonizing (with their consent) the Free People of Colour residing in our country, in Africa, or such

other place as Congress shall deem most expedient."<sup>22</sup> Societies organized in the individual states, working with the same object as that of the parent Society, and contributing to the funds of the central treasury, were to be considered auxiliary to it. Auxiliary societies were formed during the year 1817 in Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York, Virginia and Ohio.<sup>23</sup>

During the decade 1830-1840 the Maryland Colonization Society adopted policies that were practically independent of the parent organization. It established an African settlement of its own at Cape Palmas, miles south of the older settlements founded by the American Colonization Society. Here Maryland sent her Negro emigrants; between 1833 and 1838 nine expeditions were sent out.<sup>24</sup>

Reform of the State constitution was a major political issue in Maryland during the 1830's. Under the constitution as it stood until 1837, a minority of the population exercised undue power. As the House of Delegates was composed of four members from each county and two from the cities of Baltimore and Annapolis, the smaller and less populous counties had as much influence in the House as the larger ones; ten counties, with perhaps a little over one-third of the population of the State, could cast a majority of votes.<sup>25</sup> The same situation existed in the Senate, which was chosen by a body of electors (two from each county); and as the governor and Council were selected by the two houses by joint ballot the influence of the ten

smaller counties, if brought to bear, could prevail.<sup>26</sup> The disparity resulting from this system had existed from the time of the adoption of the constitution, but had increased with the rapid growth of Baltimore and the western counties.

Dissatisfaction with the system under which the State was governed extended to other features in addition to the organization of the legislature. The method of electing the governor, and the tenure of many offices, particularly those of the county clerks and registers of wills--profitable offices held during good behavior, in effect, for life--also became the subject of violent opposition.

For years, every effort to reform the constitution met with failure; in March 1837, however, the legislature, coerced by the state of public feeling, adopted most of the amendments advocated by the reform movement. The governor and State senators were to be elected directly by the people, a more equitable apportionment of representation in the House of Delegates was provided for, and the term of service of the county officials was reduced to seven years.<sup>27</sup> The reform movement, which had been active as early as 1807, had finally succeeded in changing the State governmental system, which had been in reality a confederation of counties, each with an equal voice in the legislature, without regard to population or economic importance.

Thus the year 1837 brought both political reform and financial catastrophe to Maryland. Years of depression followed the speculative boom; by the end of the decade the State was in precarious fiscal condition due to development too rashly undertaken. The 1840's, however, were to bring the re-establishment of financial stability, and once again Maryland would enter an era of prosperity and economic

expansion.

B. Printing in Maryland in the 1830's

Printing in Maryland began at a very early date; probably only Massachusetts and Pennsylvania antedated Maryland in the establishment of a permanent press. From its seventeenth century beginnings in St. Mary's City, the first capital, Maryland printing by the fourth decade of the nineteenth century had become a flourishing business centered in Baltimore, the State's bustling metropolis.

During the period under consideration, government publications provided the printers and publishers of Maryland with the greatest amount of work. Publications of the State government were printed almost exclusively in Annapolis, the firms of Jonas Green, Jeremiah Hughes and William McNeir specializing in this field. In Baltimore, government printing was largely concerned with the municipal government and the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. Lucas and Deaver, Sands and Neilson, and William Wooddy were Baltimore's largest government publishers.

After government publications, works in the religious field led all others. In this field the leading Catholic publisher was Fielding Lucas, Jr. A man of great public spirit who was connected with many civic and industrial enterprises, Lucas was born in Fredericksburg, Virginia, in 1781. He first entered business in Philadelphia, and then in 1806, in Baltimore, established the firm of Conrad, Lucas and Company, of which he shortly became the sole proprietor. He was an Episcopalian, but married Elizabeth Carrell, a Catholic, and for many years attended mass at the Cathedral, where he was even a pew-holder. Lucas died in 1854; he was received into the



Catholic Church on his deathbed, and was buried from the Cathedral. It is related that he had considered himself a Catholic for many years.<sup>28</sup>

The year 1835 saw the founding of John Murphy and Company, a firm which was to achieve an excellent reputation for the high quality of its publications, which included many Catholic works as well as books for juveniles and school books. Born in Ireland in 1812, Murphy came to this country in 1822. He had learned the printing trade in Philadelphia before setting up his own press in Baltimore.<sup>29</sup>

Another outstanding printer of the period was Joseph Robinson. He was born in Frederick County, Maryland, in 1787, but at an early age went to Baltimore, where he learned the printing trade. While still in his early twenties, he was listed in the Baltimore Directory as a printer and proprietor of a circulating library. A prominent Mason, Robinson specialized in the printing of Masonic publications; school and college catalogues also formed part of the output of his press. He remained active in his business until his death in Baltimore in 1863.<sup>30</sup>

The center of German printing in Maryland was the press of Johann Gruber in Hagerstown. Gruber's best-known production, the Hagerstown Town and Country Almanac, is the second almanac, in point of age, in the United States, the first being the Farmer's Almanac, which was first printed in Boston in 1792 and which is now known as the Old Farmer's Almanac.

In 1795, Gruber began the publication, in Hagerstown, of the German-language newspaper Die Westliche Correspondenz. The paper continued until 1830. In 1796, Gruber announced the publication of Der Neue Nord-Americanische Stadt und Land Calender, the almanac which was to make him famous, and which was destined to last well over one hundred years, finally being discontinued at the time of the first World War. The English edition of the almanac was begun in 1822 and has continued ever since. Gruber engaged actively in the printing trade until about 1855, dying in 1857 in his ninetieth year.<sup>31</sup>

Among the Maryland periodicals of the time, one of the most influential was Niles' Weekly Register. The publication, originally known as the Weekly Register, was founded in Baltimore in 1811 by Hezekiah Niles, who remained its editor for twenty-five years. William Ogden Niles, eldest son of Hezekiah Niles, became editor of the Register in 1836. The following year, he moved the publication office of the Register to Washington, and changed the name of the periodical to Niles' National Register. William Niles published the Register for only three years, Jeremiah Hughes becoming the publisher in 1839. The famous periodical ceased publication a decade later.<sup>32</sup>

The Register differed markedly from the weekly newspapers and the other weekly magazines of its day. Hezekiah Niles visualized the value of a publication with the dual purpose of printing significant news for contemporaries, and of preserving for posterity speeches, documents, messages and correspondence of public officials. Thus, he

felt, he would mirror for the future a true picture of the period. That he succeeded is indicated by the widespread use made of the Register by historians and other students seeking a contemporary picture of the first half of the nineteenth century.

A prominent periodical of the decade was the Saturday Visiter, established in 1832 by Charles F. Cloud as publisher and Lambert A. Wilmer as editor. In 1833, the Visiter "... fixed its name in literary history... by awarding a hundred-dollar prize in a short story contest to an unknown by the name of Edgar A. Poe, for a tale called 'A Manuscript Found in a Bottle'."<sup>33</sup> Another publication, the Baltimore Monument (1836-1839), was the leading literary periodical in Baltimore during its period of publication. Founded by T. S. Arthur as a weekly, the magazine was issued as a monthly during its last year.<sup>34</sup>

An important event in journalistic history took place in Baltimore on May 17, 1837, when the first issue of the Sun appeared. The new daily, which was destined to grow into one of the leading newspapers of the United States, was founded by Arunah S. Abell, who, together with William M. Swain and Azariah H. Simmons, had one year previously started publication of the Public Ledger in Philadelphia.<sup>35</sup>

A significant statement appeared in the first issue of the Sun: "We shall give no place to religious controversy, nor to political discussions of purely partisan character... Our object will be the common good, without regard to that of sects, factions or

parties."<sup>36</sup> This statement of principles was a revolutionary departure from contemporary ideas as to the function of a newspaper. Publication of news was not regarded as an end in itself; a paper's primary function was to serve the interest--political, commercial or social--of its proprietor.

Another revolutionary feature of the Sun was its price of one cent, one-sixth the price of its six daily competitors,<sup>37</sup> who made no attempt to reach the great masses of the people, aiming rather at the influential, educated and prosperous elements.

The new paper, within the means of the masses, and with its emphasis on local news, was a success from the start, its circulation swiftly outrunning that of any other Baltimore daily. Before its first birthday, it was claiming 12,000 subscribers.<sup>38</sup> Thus the Sun, along with the other great pioneers of the "penny press"--the Philadelphia Public Ledger, the New York Sun and the New York Herald--inaugurated a new era in journalism, based on the theory that the first duty of a newspaper is to its readers, with the necessary implication that its most important function is to supply them with accurate and adequate information.

The year 1839 saw the first issue of what was to become another important Baltimore newspaper: the Baltimore Clipper. During its career, which ended in 1865, the Clipper was one of the most influential newspapers in Maryland, enjoying a large circulation and a profitable advertising list.<sup>39</sup>

Early in the nineteenth century, Baltimore began to publish sheet music in large quantities, owing largely to the increase in the number of music teachers settling in the city. The peak years of music publication were between 1820 and 1840. Among those who particularly prospered in this field during the 1830's were George Willig, Jr., John Cole, Frederick D. Benteen, and Samuel Carusi, who published the song, "Long, Long Ago," in 1837.<sup>40</sup> The music publishing firm of George Willig, Jr. had originally been established by Baltimore's pioneer music publisher, Joseph Carr, who opened his Musical Repository in 1794. The business is thought to have passed into the hands of the Willig family in 1822, where it remained until 1910, when it was taken over by the G. Fred Kranz Music Company.<sup>41</sup>

John Cole, who came to Baltimore from England in 1786 as a boy of twelve, was one of the city's earliest publishers of music. In Baltimore, he learned the printing trade, in addition to composing and teaching music. Cole later became a bookseller, and then a music publisher, beginning the latter endeavor sometime prior to 1808. In 1835, he associated his son, George T. Cole, with him as John Cole and Son. In 1839, they were succeeded by Frederick D. Benteen, who, during the next decade, was to become one of the leading music publishers in the country.<sup>42</sup>
