p. 239 Anne Cranly sayth uppon oath in open Court th^t the dēft did not putt her of, of her plantaōn: but told her th^t shee should not bring another to liue there wth her; for by th^t meanes hee mought bee eate out of howse & home, & shee further sayth th^t the Lease was missing, or lost halfe a yeare before her husband Gregory dyed.

Michàel Cranley deposed likewise sayth, That Two yeares agoe hee saw Tobaccho stalkes uppon th^t plantaōn or grownd formerly belonging to Thomas Gregory, But saw not the Tob growing there, yett he beleiueth th^t eyther Michàel Baysey himselfe, or some other planted there th^t yeare.

Rob^t Macklin deposed allso sayth, That uppon th^t grownd w^{ch} was Gregories there was cleared grownd for about fiue thowsand plants, & th^t the Corne grownd was fenced together wth Michàel Bayseys.

The Judgm^t of the Court is th^t the p^{if}, being Admīstrato^r to the fores^d Thomas Gregory, ought to haue the benefitt of the Lease.

Ordered therefore th^t the dēft pay unto the Admīstrato^e 200^l Tob, & Two barrells of Corne, for the two yeares he made use of the s^d Gregories grownd: & make the p^{if} satisfaction for the time remayning of the s^d Lease, or ells to deliuer quiett possesⁿ of the Land according to the Lease unto the p^{if}.

The humble Petⁿ of Rich: Husbands Sheweth, That yo^r Pet^r hauing about seauen yeares since transported diuers Scotts into Virginia, sent them from thence into this prouince in his sloop, by Cap^t Cooke then yo^r Pet^{rs} mate, Who when hee came into this prouince, landed them att the howse of Will^m Edwin, where they remayned some time, the charge whereof yo^r Pet^r satisfied to the s^d Edwin. Yett soe it is, th^t about a yeare or two after, the s^d Edwin arrested Captaine Cooke, for the Charge the s^d Scotts had putt him to (yo^r Pet^r being then out of the Country) & thereuppon obteyned & serued an Execuōn uppon Three hogsheads of Tob aboard of the ship goulden ffortune Cap^t Tilghman Coṃander, for th^t debt formerly satisfied by yo^r Pet^r as afores^d to yo^r Pet^{rs} greate dammage.

In tender Consideraōn whereof yo^r Pet^r humbly prayes th^t hee may haue satisfaction for the s^d Tob, wth such dammages susteyned
