All free white persons who emigrated or settled within this state before the adoption of the constitution of the United States, and had continued inhabitants, deemed and declared to be entitled to all the immunities of natural born citizens, so as to hold real estate, and transfer the same, &c.—1813, ch. 105, . . . . . 621

Aliens having emigrated into this state since the adoption of the constitution of the United States, and acquired lands or titles thereto, and having afterwards become naturalized, to enjoy such lands, &c. as if naturalized at the time of acquisition—1814, ch. 79, . . . . . 625

NEGROES AND SLAVES.

A legislative declaration that Maryland is a slaveholding state—1839, ch. 338, . . . . . 2448

The relation of master and servant shall not be abolished, unless a bill so to abolish the same, shall be passed by the unanimous vote of the members of each branch of the general assembly, and confirmed by the next general assembly with the like unanimity; and then not without full compensation to the master for the property of which he shall be deprived—Const. 1836, ch. 197, sec. 26, p. xviii.
