At a Session of the General Assembly of Maryland, begun and held at the City of Annapolis, on the last Monday of December, being the twenty-ninth day of said month, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four, and ended the twenty-first of March, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five.

THE FOLLOWING LAWS WERE ENACTED, TO WIT:

CHAPTER 1.

CHAP. 1.

An act to authorise and empower John H. Bayne, of Prince George's county, to sell and dispose of his negro woman Mary, who is a slave only for a term of years, beyond the limits of this State. Passed Jan. 6, 1835

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That Sale authorised
from and after the passage of this act, it shall and may be lawful for John H. Bayne, of Prince George's county, to sell or otherwise dispose of his negro woman named Mary, who is but a slave for a term of years, to any person or persons beyond the limits of this State, any act of the General Assembly of this State to the contrary notwithstanding.
