

SPECIFICATIONS

Of Disloyalty of Levin L. Waters, Esq., thereby being disqualified from holding any office of honor, profit or trust under the Laws of Maryland.

1. In this that the said Levin L. Waters about the month of April, 1861, permitted a flag of the so-called "Confederate States" to be raised near the door of the Printing office occupied by him in the town of Princess Anne, Md., and that the said flag remained there during the months of May, June and July of said year, with the halyards leading into the window of the office of said Waters, and that this was done with his consent and approbation.

2. In this, that the said Levin L. Waters, about the twenty-fifth day of July, 1861, in the town of Princess Anne, Md., publicly rejoiced at the defeat of the armies of the United States at the battle of Bull Run, and expressed a desire for the triumph of the States in rebellion.

3. In this, that the said Levin L. Waters, about the month of March, 1862, in the town of Princess Anne, Md., publicly rejoiced at the defeat of the armies of the United States at Balls Bluff, and at the death of Col. Baker.

4. In this, that the said Levin L. Waters, about the month of October, 1862, in Somerset county, advised a Geo. McClemmy to cross the Chesapeake Bay and join the rebel army rather than serve in the armies of the United States, into which said McClemmy had been drafted; and in this, that said Waters contributed to the support of the family of said McClemmy during the year 1863, while he, said McClemmy, served in the rebel army.
