

inhabitants within their respective beats, as to be enabled at once to recognize them.

4. They must carefully examine every part of their respective beats, especially in the night time, and see that doors and windows are not left unsecured. Should a Policeman be stopped or delayed in his regular patrol by any special cause requiring him to remain at a particular place, he must satisfy his superior officers that there was cause for his so remaining.

5. They shall strictly watch the conduct of all suspicious persons, or those of known bad character who may live or be found in their several beats, and take notice of the time and the particular part of their beats where such persons may be seen, and of any attending circumstances worthy of notice. When any serious offence shall be discovered to have been committed, the Policemen shall state to their respective Captains what persons of such character they may have observed and at what places.

6. They shall observe all houses and places in which they may have reason to think that gambling is being carried on in violation of law, and report the result of their observations to their commanding officers.

7. All persons arrested must be forthwith taken to the station-house of the district to which the Policeman making the arrest is attached. Whenever any person charges another with the commission of a crime, and requires the party to be taken into custody, the Policeman called on to make the arrest shall require the accuser to accompany him as a witness, along with the accused to the station-house—or if the former be a known responsible person, the Policeman may be satisfied with his assurance that he will immediately repair to the station-house. The Policeman will return as soon as possible to his beat, and inspect the same, to see that no depredation has been committed in his absence.

8. No Policeman shall leave his beat until regularly relieved, except for the purpose of taking a party arrested to the station-house, of rendering assistance when summoned by a Policeman on a neighboring beat, or of interfering to prevent crime or arrest offenders in cases falling under his own observation, in the adjacent parts of neighboring beats. Special instructions will be given at the station-houses and through the Sergeants, as to the mode in which signals for assistance are to be made, and the circumstances under which they are to be given, and to be attended to,

9. Whenever a Policeman is called from his beat in the discharge of his duty, he will return to it without delay, as soon as his services elsewhere can be dispensed with. Whilst he is absent, all the Policemen on adjoining beats, who may be
