Your committee also beg leave to say that some of the doors, windows and sash are very much out of repair, and we would recommend that the Inspector, James T. Perkins, Esq., be authorized to have it done at the expense of the State.

They also find that the hoisting apparatus is very much out of order and would advise that the Inspector be authorized to have it done in such manner as he may think best for the interest of the State. We also find that Mr. Perkins, the present Inspector, has paid into the State Treasury up to 1st January, 1864, the sum of \$6,974 09, which an examination of the Comptroller's Books proves to be correct.

A further statement of the affairs and workings of this House will be found in the official report of the Inspector made to this General Assembly, which your committee deems unnecessary to repeat in this report.

WAREHOUSE NO. 2.

Your committee then proceeded to examine State Tobacco Warehouse No. 2, and failing to find the Inspector, James Turner, Esq., present, he being detained by sickness, they were under the guidance of his Clerk, Mr. Jones, who showed us through the building, which we found to be in bad condition, and very much in need of repairs; a statement of which will hereafter be made in this report.
